At last the season has started on what was a sunny hot day at Berkhamsted. ECB covid rules applied to the match meant that after every 6 overs there would be a break to sanitise hands and ball. All players were to socially distance. Stage skippered by Duncan Gordon-Smith won the toss and chose to field.

Prior to starting the match, players and officials from both sides stood in a socially distanced semi-circle whilst Richard Godfrey said a few words for our dear departed Mike Sadler followed by a 2 minute silence.

The opening bowlers for Stage were Ed Babar and Sam Sargent, both bowled tight opening spells. Ed's first spell was 3 overs for 1 wicket with only 1 run conceded. Sam took 1 for 21 from his 6 overs. Matt Gallagher replaced Ed and completed his 8 overs taking 3 wickets for 34 runs while Jeff Davis bowled his 8 overs taking 1 for just 8 runs. In Ed Babar's second spell of just one over he took another wicket and finished with figures of 3 overs 2 for 3. Richard Godfrey and Al Barrie took 2 wickets each which meant Berkhamsted were all out for just 100 runs (10 wickets as both sides were playing with 12 players)

Tea was taken with all players eating their own sandwiches, cakes etc. Not sure who won the prize for the best tea. Following the tea break Stage opened with Chis Fletcher and Chris Currie and got off to a reasonable start with the first wicket falling on 14. The next wicket went on 40 with Stage feeling very comfortable when it all started to fall apart. The following 3 wickets fell on 44 in the 13th, 14th and 15th over and it was looking like a typical Stage snatching defeat from the jaws of victory. Richard Godfrey steadied the ship hitting a steady 15 eventually being caught when the score was 94. Jeff Davis and Al Barrie saw Stage over the line with 4 overs to spare so completing Stage's first and hopefully not last victory of the season. I am sure that Mike Sadler was watching with a smile on his face.

Graham Seed the new club skipper won the toss for Stage and chose to bowl in a timed match with last hour due to start at 6.15. The opening bowlers were Matt Gallagher and Anu Dissanayake making his debut for the Stage. Both bowled tightly at the start with Taplow going at 4 over for the first 10 overs. Roger Barret replaced Anu and proceeded to take the first wicket on 50 runs with Anu taking a fine catch in the deep. Wickets were hard to come by however the bowling remained tight especially from Duncan Gordon-Smith who bowled a spell of 11 overs taking 4 wickets for 50 runs. Taplow declared on 208 after 39 overs which was a very fair declaration.

The Taplow tea (one of the best on the card) was sadly missed, as we all had to bring our own teas due to ECB Covid-19 guidelines. Following the tea Stage opened with Chris Fletcher and Chris Currie, the same pair as last week at Berkhamsted. Both batted well and at the start of the last hour Stage required 148 to win which looked very unlikely however both openers accelerated the scoring with Fletcher making 40 and Currie a fine 58. The first wicket fell at 101 with 13 overs to go and with Matt Gallagher scoring a quick 18 followed by another quick 16 from Anu, the win was still on but then the Stage collapsed at 151 for 3 as suddenly became 154 for 7 with Stage eventually holding out for a well-deserved draw.

Rob West came on first change replacing Matt and bowled a very good spell of 10 overs, 4 maidens, 26 runs whilst taking 3 wickets, including 2

wicket maidens. He was backed up with tight bowling from all the other 5 bowlers used and Ashford generously declared on 186 for 5 wickets off 38 overs.

After tea Chris Currie and Rob West opened the batting and got off to a superb start, with the first wicket falling on 123 in the 16<sup>th</sup> over, when Chris was caught on 56. Rob went on to score a fine 75, leaving Matt Gallagher 21 and Ed Babar 19 to finish chasing the total down in a total of just 29 overs

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On our visit to Ickenham, Stage lost the toss and were asked to bowl. On an extremely good batting track, Ickenham put on the runs with ease and declared after 39 overs on 264 for 2 wickets. Joe Mannick scored a fine 101 before being bowled by Jeff Davis. Alastair Whatley took the other Ickenham wicket in a fine spell of 10 overs.

After tea Stage set about chasing the 264 down with another big opening partnership of 143 between Gwyn Jones and Gabe Manthorp. Gabe managed to run himself out on 64 bringing in Hiten Patel who scored a quick 25 whilst Gwyn continued to pick off the Ickenham bowlers. The total was reached in the 38 over with Gwyn Jones carrying his bat with an unbeaten 113 and the first ton of the season for a Stage batsman.

On a cool day, we had to make the long walk from the pavilion down to the lower ground, as there was some pyjama cricket taking place on the main ground. Sunbury won the toss and batted first. Sunbury consisted of 11 young players and one senior player (Nobby Clarke) Nobby only last week had taken his 1000<sup>th</sup> wicket for Sunbury which is a fantastic feat. Sunbury batted well against the opening attack of Ed Babar and Matt Gallagher. The first wicket was taken by Matt in the 9 overs with 28 on the board. Ed took the 2<sup>nd</sup> wicket in the next over and it looked like Stage might run through the Sunbury batting. However, Sunbury made a strong recovery with the 3<sup>rd</sup> wicket not falling until the 27<sup>th</sup> over, with the score on 136. Sunbury declared on 217 for 8 after 40 overs, with Ed taking 3 for 27 from 9 overs and Jeff Davis taking 3 for 62 from 9.5 overs. Chris Currie took 3 catches in the innings.

After tea Chris Currie and Martin Mathews opened the batting with Chris fortunately surviving the first ball, when the ball hit one of the stumps, the bail lifted out the groove and stayed on the top of the stump. Unfortunately he was caught in the next over. Archie Gordon-Smith came in at number 3 and was looking good until he drove the ball hard into the covers and was caught on 13. Ed Babar (78) steadied the innings along with Roger Barrett (41) but at 172 for 5, things started to get close. The 8<sup>th</sup> wicket fell on 206 bringing in, the out of form Jeff Davis, having had 2 ducks in his previous matches. He faced 5 balls to get off the mark with a single, stealing the strike from skipper Graham Seed for the last over with 11 runs required. The second ball of the last over went for 5 wides which was extremely helpful in the chase. Two short balls were both hooked by Jeff to square leg for 4 bringing the 4<sup>th</sup> Stage victory of the season.

First change was Roger Barrett who bowled very tidily taking 2 wickets for 29 from 6 overs. He was replaced by Jeff Davis, who also took 2 wickets for 49 from his 8 overs. Jeff's pride, took a bit of a bashing, when Akil was on 99 and refused a single as he was wanting to complete his hundred in glory. He followed up with a huge 6 before retiring to give other Wembley players a chance to bat. Max Higginbotham bowled a spell of 13 overs for just 55 runs. Highlight was when the ball was smashed back at Jeff Davis who only managed to palm the ball over the bar whilst shouting "Oh No" only to turn around and see Alastair Whatley taking a superb catch whilst diving towards the ball.

Stage's reply was led by Owen Oldroyd who hit a fine 67 but with some slow batting in the middle order, Stage never got close to the Wembley total ending up on 187 which was 90 runs short of the target.

Sam Sargant and Roger McCann opened the bowling for Stage and the Musicians XI got off to a reasonable start with the first wicket falling in the 10<sup>th</sup> over with score on 60. Sam Sargant kept charging in for 11 overs and whilst bowling really well was unable to take any wickets. Duncan Gordon-Smith replaced Roger McCann after 13 overs and the runs started to dry up for the Musicians as well as wickets starting to fall. Ed Babar (Yes of Stage CC) came in at number 5 and batted really well for a fine 66 before being dismissed. Duncan bowled a FANTASTIC spell of 14 overs taking 6 wickets for 70 runs whilst at the other end Jeff Davis bowled 9 overs for 40 runs whilst taking the other 3 wickets required. Musicians XI were bowled out for 216 of 40 overs.

After Rory was dismissed, Hamilton Lee and Al Barrie had a brief partnership before Hamilton was bowled for 10 runs. Another quick wicket and skipper Graham Seed was beginning to have his doubts as to whether we could win this hard fought match. Jeff Davis was due in however was not padded up when the wicket fell so Duncan strode to the wicket like a man on a mission. He had said at tea that he wanted to hit the winning runs with a 6. Chris Fletcher was the first to be dismissed when the score was on 20 in the 9<sup>th</sup> over. This bought Gwyn Jones to the wicket and all hopes of a big score were pinned on Gwyn and Owen. Unfortunately this was not to be, as Owen fell for 19 with 35 runs on the board quickly followed by Gwyn whilst the score remained on 35. Max Higginbotham was determined not to let this happen and proceeded to take wickets consistently throughout Montenotte's innings. Stage bowled 13 overs before the last 20 overs started with the score on 85, so Montenotte required a further 112 at under 6 an over to win with 7 wickets in hand. Max bowled throughout the innings with an unbroken spell of 16.3 overs taking 8 of the 9 Montenotte wickets. The other being a run out from the man in the grey jumper.
